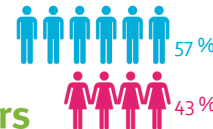

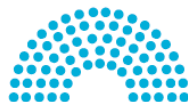

- Every country achieves a higher level of **industrialization** in their economies, and benefits from the globalization of markets for industrial goods and services
- **No one is left behind** in benefiting from growth, and prosperity is shared among women and men in all countries
- Broader economic and social growth is supported within an **environmentally sustainable** framework
- The unique **knowledge and resources of all relevant development actors** are combined to maximize the development impact of ISID

TOP FUNDING PARTNERS FOR UNIDO PROGRAMMES AND PROJECTS IN 2021 (in millions)



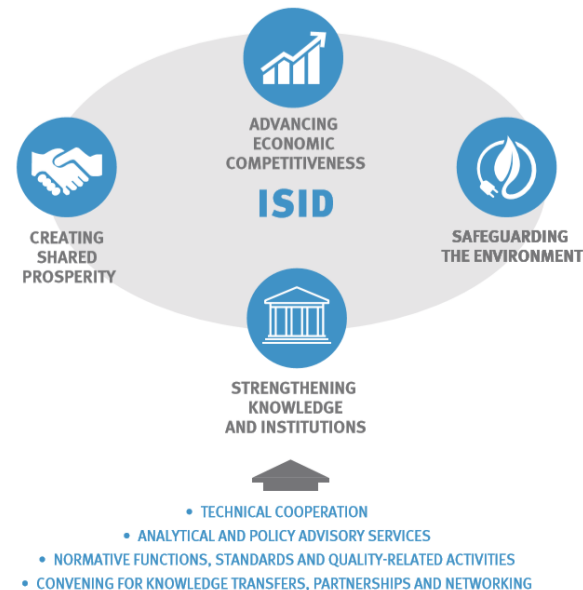

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UNIDO STRATEGIC FRAMEWORKS

Within the scope of its mandate, the guidance provided by its Member States, and the globally agreed development framework (2030 Agenda), UNIDO prepares the following documents to plan its future activities:

LONG TERM STRATEGIC VISION: ISID with a time horizon of approximately ten years (currently: Lima Declaration)

MEDIUM-TERM PROGRAMME FRAMEWORK (MTPF): With a duration of four years (currently 2022-2025)

PROGRAMME AND BUDGETS: Documents for a period two years (current biennium: 2022-2023)

INTEGRATION AND SCALE UP TO BUILD BACK BETTER

In 2022-2025 UNIDO will focus on:

- Integration of impact dimensions of ISID - economic, social, environmental
- Integration of focus areas of expertise through multi-theme approaches
- Scale-up of behavioural outcomes through replication, adaptation and mainstreaming of solutions
- Integration of core functions to deliver holistic support
- Integrated solution packages and knowledge that address complex industrial development problems

UNIDO's contribution to ISID and the 2030 Agenda is supported by and demonstrated via the Organization's Theory of Change and results-based management systems, which generate strong results evidence and data for decision-making.



UNIDO AND THE 2030 AGENDA

ISID touches upon **social, economic and environmental** challenges...

UNIDO helps countries to realize **inclusive and sustainable industrial development** (SDG 9)

- through **multi-stakeholder partnerships** (SDG 17, 16);
- thus generating **economic growth and jobs** (SDG 8);
- which **reduce poverty, hunger and inequalities** (SDGs 1, 2 and 10);
- and realize social inclusiveness through **women and youth empowerment and employment** (SDGs 4 and 5);
- while **improving health and well-being** (SDG 3) and
- **safeguarding the environment by promoting resource and energy efficiency and renewable energy** (SDGs 6, 7 and 12);
- as well as **reducing greenhouse gas emissions and pollution** (SDGs 11, 13, 14 and 15).

Programme for Country Partnership (PCP)

The Programme for Country Partnership (PCP) was first introduced in 2014. The pilot phase comprised Cambodia, Ethiopia, Kyrgyzstan, Morocco, Peru and Senegal. The PCP portfolio progressively expanded to include Côte d'Ivoire, Egypt, Rwanda, the United Republic of Tanzania and Zambia. In 2021, Nigeria became the newest PCP approved for development. Going forward, the programme will gradually expand to additional countries.
